very election cycle, we hear that this is the election that really matters. In 2018, that's never been more true.

We know corporate America is spending millions to break unions and take away our freedom to rise together. Wealthy special interests don't want to share their power or their money. Our very existence as a union of people committed to making life better for ourselves, our families and our communities is at stake.

This year, we have the rare opportunity to turn all three branches, the Minnesota Governorship, House and Senate, into a pro-worker bastion. To vote for candidates who believe real freedom comes from being able to attend parent-teacher conferences, go to the doctor and retire with dignity. Who care about the 99 percent, not just the rich.

The first step is electing U.S. Rep. Tim Walz as Governor. He's a former teacher, football coach and National Guardsman who will follow in Gov. Dayton's footsteps as a staunch supporter of labor. If we want our state contracts approved, if we want funding for quality public programs, if we want a leader who believes that public services matter or should even exist, we must elect Walz.

His opponent wants to destroy us: Jeff Johnson has infamously said he wants to "go all Scott Walker on Minnesota."

Ensuring Minnesota stays pro-worker means electing Joe Perske for Senate in District 13. Perske, a County Commissioner and former mayor, is running for the only open Senate seat. It's being vacated by Michelle Fischbach, who acted as both Senate president and Lieutenant Governor in violation of our Constitution.

Nationally, we must elect our fine U.S. Senators Amy Klobuchar and Tina Smith. The GOP-led Senate already confirmed one Supreme Court justice who is so anti-worker, he ruled it was OK to fire a trucker who temporarily left a broken-down trailer - after several hours of waiting for help – rather than freeze to death. # Elect a Governor for working people

or the past eight years, working people and our families have had a strong supporter in Gov. Mark Dayton. This election, when our freedom to stand together is under attack by billionaires and corporate CEOs, it's more important than ever that we elect someone who will follow his example and fight for working people.

AFSCME Council 5 has found that true champion of working people in Tim Walz.

The Council 5 Executive Board – made up of members, elected by members – unanimously endorsed Tim Walz and Peggy Flanagan for Governor and Lieutenant Governor following their decisive primary victory.

Congressman Walz is a former teacher and football coach who served for 24 years in the Army National Guard. His parents instilled a commitment to the common good and selfless service; summers spent farming with his family reinforced those values. In Congress, Tim worked across party lines to make health care more affordable, support quality education, toughen ethics laws and help our veterans.

Tim is running for Governor to bring Minnesotans across our great state together and to make sure everyone gets a fair shot.

State Rep. Flanagan is a citizen of the White Earth Nation of Ojibwe who is dedicated to building coalitions and working on behalf of children and families. Peggy is a strong advocate for people of color, indigenous communities and working people.

"Tim and Peggy have strong track records of supporting the rights of workers, allowing us to make life better for ourselves, our families and our communities," says Council 5 executive director John P. Westmoreland. "We are confident they will stand up to the billionaires and other corporate special interests trying to take away our rights

and silence our powerful, united voice."

"We can count on people like Tim who respect the work we do and our right to organize and bargain collectively," says Patrick Guernsey, the newly elected president of Council 5. "We expect he'll build on Gov. Dayton's legacy and continue to make Minnesota the most livable state in the union, with quality public services and a large middle class work force."

Tim and Peggy will:

- Make sure every Minnesotan has access to high-quality health care at a price they can afford.
- Lower health care costs.
- Fight for lower class sizes, universal pre-K, career and technical education and affordable college.
- Build an economy that works for all of us.

- Continue fighting tax breaks that benefit the wealthy few, just as Tim has in Congress. He voted against the Trump tax plan that gives big tax cuts to the rich and their corporations; puts Medicare and Social Security at risk; and is making the debt skyrocket.
- "I'm proud to be endorsed by, and stand with, my union sisters and brothers of AFSCME Council 5 to protect workers' rights," Tim Walz says.
- "As a lifelong educator and proud public sector union member, I understand how important unions are to ensure workers' and their families' rights are protected," he says. "This is even more important after the Supreme Court's Janus decision earlier this summer. As your next Governor, I will stand with you and fight every day to ensure our unions stay strong in Minnesota."

How high are the stakes this election? Ask lowa. You can see what happened weeks after they elected an anti-worker GOP Governor and Legislature.

FSCME members have a unique opportunity this November to vote for fellow Council 5 members who share our belief that public workers and public services make life better for all.

Five members are running for election or reelection to the Minnesota House:

- Kelly Moller, District 42A, AFSCME Local 2938
- Zack Stephenson, District 36A, Local 2938
- · Assistant Minority Leader Dave Pinto, District 64B, Local 8; House Committees include Public Safety, Health and Human Services, and Commerce and Regulatory Reform.
- Jamie Becker-Finn, District 42B, Local 2938; House Committees include Public Safety, Environment and Veterans Affairs.
- Erin Koegel, District 37A, Local 8; Committees include Health and Human Services Reform, Transportation and the Subcommittee on Childcare Access.

Moller is an Assistant Hennepin County Attorney who handles criminal appeals on behalf of the state, and has worked to secure victim privacy and strengthen hit-and-run laws. She serves on Shoreview's Public Safety Committee.

"As a State Representative, I will listen to the people of our district and be a voice for them with the same thoughtfulness, passion, and conviction that I have had as a prosecutor seeking justice," Moller said. "When elected, I look forward to working with AFSCME to bring the voices of working Minnesotans to the Capitol."



Stephenson is an Assistant Hennepin County Attorney who handles criminal cases and serves on the Coon Rapids Planning Commission.

"Thank you to AFSCME members for trusting me to be a

voice for working families. I won't let you down," Stephenson says.

Incumbent Rep. Pinto is an Assistant Ramsey County Attorney, where he fights juvenile sex trafficking.

"As an assistant leader in the House DFL, I'm playing a key role in working to advance our progressive agenda - racial and gender equity, clean water and air, robust and broadly shared prosperity," Pinto says.

Rep. Becker-Finn is an Assistant Hennepin County Attorney who focuses on domestic violence; and a Leech Lake Band of Ojibwe descendant: "I am a thoughtful, respectful leader who values honesty and authenticity. I believe that regular people can work together to achieve positive changes in our communities," she says.

Rep. Koegel is a volunteer coordinator for Community Action Partnership of Ramsey and Washington Counties, and former executive director of the nonprofit Health Care for All.
