Since then, Jamaal has been an active member of the AFSCME Maryland State Bargaining Team and is a core member of the team that meets with the State for Labor Management Committee (LMC) meetings on pay equity. After his most recent meeting with the State, he reflected that, "While the State did let us know we're short-staffed and vastly underpaid, their actions didn't seem to match. It's like they're just not comprehending or understanding how bad the problems are. We're still far behind, but we're going to keep fighting."
