Pass SB 5082 – Bring Back the Productivity Board



Before the program was cut following the Great Recession, state employees who submitted a cost-saving idea to the board were compensated financially with a portion of the savings. Historically, every \$1 paid out to a state employee was offset by \$10 in savings. Write a letter.

Pass SB 5844 – Protect Higher Ed Trades Work



As you've probably noticed, the cost of everyday goods has gone up dramatically. The same is true for materials needed to maintain our higher education institutions. Unfortunately, the bid limit (the maximum amount that schools can spend on maintenance projects by in-house staff) has not been increased in over 10 years. Senate Bill 5844 would provide a modest increase in the bid limit to reflect inflation and protect the work performed by WFSE members. Write a letter.

• Pass HB 1837 – Protection from Repetitive-Motion Injuries



The legislature is considering a bill (HB 1837) that would allow Labor and Industries to adopt regulations to prevent repetitive motion injuries. We are gathering member stories to help pass this legislation. Share your story

• Pass HB 1153 – Increasing Language Access in Schools



Though there is no shortage of professionally credentialed interpreters in Washington, school districts rely on students, family members, and unqualified staff to interpret for parents with limited English proficiency (LEP).
